I first started working with "little kids" when my brothers, then 3, had trouble staying in their preschool classroom. I was recruited to help. It was much more interesting than being with my own age group, so I liked it. With me in the room, my brothers stayed put. I was 6.

Since then I've worked with children as a teacher, counsellor, music maker, project developer, storyteller, artist and caregiver. I've taught in many venues --and with children of all ages: 2 to 6 year olds in Montessor; JK to Grade Six with TDSB; youth at summer camps and in faith communities and varying subjects (including communication, parenting and supervision) with adults.

My official credentials include degrees in the sciences and arts. After earning my doctorate (right/left brain learning focused on music) I promised myself future study would just be for fun. And it has been --with courses in visual arts, computer, music and learning on the go as I work on projects. I've had articles in various journals and two other curriculum projects published.
